Reporting under the MCMP



Mandatory Reporting to the Independent Third Party (ITP)

Where Hockey Canada, a Member or a Minor Hockey Association becomes aware of conduct which may amount to Prohibited Behaviour, they have a duty to report that conduct to the ITP.



Prohibited Behaviours

This includes Maltreatment (volitional acts resulting in physical or psychological harm), Grooming and other breaches of the Universal Code of Conduct to Prevent and Address Maltreatment in Sport (UCCMS).



ITP Responsibilities

The ITP is responsible for screening, determining jurisdiction and selecting independent investigators or adjudicators to ensure a procedurally fair process for all parties.

Reporting to Law Enforcement and/or Child Protection Services (CPS)



Reporting to Law Enforcement and/or CPS

The ITP has a duty to report certain instances of Prohibited Behaviour to law enforcement and/or CPS pursuant to Section 14 of the MCMP.



ITP Reporting Obligations

The ITP must notify CPS upon receiving a complaint involving sexual maltreatment, physical maltreatment, grooming, or self-harm of a minor by a non-minor, or where reporting is otherwise required by applicable legislation.

When In Doubt, Report

The ITP making a report does not replace other individuals’ obligations to report. Reporting duties cannot be delegated. Make a report, even if you believe someone else already has.
